The Connecticut River Valley Flood Control Commission, established September 8, 1953 when the signatory states of Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Vermont ratified the Compact which states, in Article I:

The principal purposes of this Compact are:

- a) To promote inter-state comity among and between the signatory states;
- b) To assure adequate storage capacity for impounding waters of the Connecticut River and its tributaries for the protection of life and property from floods;
- c) To provide a joint or common agency through which the signatory states, while promoting protecting and preserving to each the local interest and sovereignty of the respective signatory states, may more effectively cooperate in accomplishing the object of flood control and water resources utilization in the basin of the Connecticut River and its tributaries.

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CHAIR'S REPORT July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024

The Commission has done two site visits in the fiscal year to better be educated about the various projects for which it is responsible.

September 23, 2023 the Commission visited the North Hartland Dam and was provided with a tour of the site and a presentation on the history of the project and its current operation. The July flooding that wreaked havoc in much of Vermont had an impact on the project and staff showed some of the results of the flooding. It should be emphasized that the dam did what it was designed to do and did not reach a dangerous level.

June 24, 2024 the Commission visited the North Springfield Dam. Corps staff provided a presentation on the history of the project and its current operation and led us on a tour of the project.

The ongoing issues with Vermont's West River are still prominent on our radar.

The Upper West River SGA (Stream Geomorphic Assessment) work was delayed by the flooding in Vermont last summer. Fitzgerald Environmental Associates got pulled into lots of emergency repair and resiliency work, so they requested an extension on the SGA. The new schedule was to have all work completed by the time this report is published.

The Stream Geomorphic Assessment will eventually open up funding for projects to solve sedimentation issues at Townsend Dam.

Commissioners discussed the history of the sedimentation issue, as well as the effects of changing climate, and water quality concerns.

Tax loss payments to affected Vermont towns continue to occupy the Commission's time.

A letter was sent on February 15, 2024 to the governors of the four compact states asking that they take a look at the issue. As of this writing, there has been no response from any of the states.

We have learned that only Vermont forwards the payments to the towns while the others keep it in the general fund, which may be why the Commission does not get complaints about the payments from towns in the other states.

The Commission is committed to fulfilling its obligations as set out in the 1953 enabling legislation.

- 1. Old Business

Angela Chaffee shared a recent update. The contract end date has been extended to April 1, 2024. Fitzgerald Environmental Associate requested this to provide them the winter months to do the quality control work and final report rather than during the fall field season. We have requested a copy of the final report. Commission provided a background on this issue. Angela will send copy of contract.
 - e. Review of final FY 2022-23 expenses.
 - 2. New Business
 - a. CRC's invoice: Paid via standing motion.
 - b. Commission discussed adjusting frequency of reviewing Standing Motions & Document Retention policy from annually to every other year. Paul Berch moved to review the standing motions and document retention policy every other year, second by John Arrison. Motion passed.
 - c. Nominating committee proposes Gary Moore as Chair, Paul Berch as Vice-Chair (replacing Denise Ruzicka as Chair and Gary Moore as Vice-Chair). Angela Chaffee, CRVFCC administrator will remain a signer on the account. Antonio Ortiz moved to accept nominations as presented, second by John Arrison. Motion passed.
 - d. Other New Business: December 6th meeting to be held in Greenfield so new officers can go to the bank and update signature cards.

December 6, 2023

 - b. Commissioner vacancies & appointments:
 - i. MA: Serve until someone is reappointed. Carl is looking for someone to replace him, possibly someone from the river valley with NRCS experience. Mike will write to the governor requesting that their recommended candidates be formally appointed. Rob is still waiting for acceptance.
 - ii. CT: Serve until someone is reappointed. Two are up for reappointment. Denise got a call from CT DEEP and they are working on having someone from the agency join the Commission.
 - iii. NH: All set.
 - iv. VT: All set.
 - c. All four states have been invoiced for their 2023-2024 annual administrative payment. NH, VT, and MA have paid. In September, Denise said she would call CT to check on payment. Angela has followed up with Denise and waits for an update.
 - d. Fitzgerald Environmental Associate continues work on the upper West River Stream Geomorphic Assessment (SGA). The SGA will eventually open up funding for projects to solve sedimentation issues at Townsend Dam. The contract end date has been extended to April 1, 2024. We have requested a copy of the final report. No further updates at this time but keep it on our agenda as an ongoing issue to track.

Discussion of sending letter to the four governors (copy to finance directors) to review this issue in order that the tax loss payments may reflect current day rates. - c. Review 2022-2023 Annual Report. John Arrison moved to approve report, second by Paul Berch. Motion passed.
- d. Set 2024 meeting schedule: March 6, June 12, September 18, December 11. Discussion of June field trip, Mike will look into visiting North Springfield, VT. Prefer to meet virtually rather than cancel in March to maintain consistency and continuity.

Graham Stevens, Bureau Chief of the Bureau of Water Protection and Land Reuse at CT Department of Energy & Environmental Protection (CT DEEP) is still interested in being appointed.
 - iii. NH: All set.
 - iv. VT: John has been reappointment and will send the paperwork to Angela.
 - c. All four states have paid their invoices for the 2023-2024 annual administrative payment.
 - d. The Upper West River SGA (Stream Geomorphic Assessment) work was delayed by the flooding in VT last summer. Fitzgerald Environmental Associates got pulled into lots of emergency repair and resiliency work so they requested an extension on the SGA. The new schedule plans to have all work completed by September. We will follow up to get a copy of the report. Commissioners discussed the history of the sedimentation issue, as well as effects of changing climate, and water quality concerns.
 - e. Letter to governors about adjusting PILOT payments was sent on February 15, 2024. There has been no response yet from the states. John followed up in VT, and the state feels they don't have adequate info to make any changes. MA EOEEA questioned why it went to them and not the tax office. MA payments do not get dispersed to each town, rather into the general fund. Discussion of lump sum payments, which is how this has been handled for other rivers and other compacts. Land values, secondary economic benefits (tourism, recreation, etc.), inflation and other factors complicate the matter. Discussion of next steps and how to get responses from the states. Commission will continue to track this.

 - a. CRC's invoice: Paid via standing motion.
 - b. Commission reviewed draft FY2024-25 budget. Update dates at bottom to 2024, increase postage budget to \$150, Evan Hammond moved to approve budget with modification as discussed, second by Paul Berch. Motion passed.
